LINCOLN PARK HISTORIC DISTRICT

The Lincoln Park Historic District was designated on May 4, 1998, and was Pomona's first residential neighborhood designated as a local historic district. The district takes its name from the City's Lincoln Park, built in 1910, and located at the center of the District; it was Pomona's third park. The design of the park was originally formal, with a lily pond, a rose garden, and unique specimens of trees and shrubs. The park was deeded to the city as a gift by the Antonio Heights Syndicate. W.G. Halstead, Fred J. Smith and Fred E. Graham (the San Antonio Heights Syndicate) had each bought a section of the park and together deeded it to the city with the provision that the land be used for park purposes only.

Lincoln Park has some of the best examples of early 20th-century architecture in Pomona. Closer to Holt, you will find examples from the Victorian era, transitional homes, and early Craftsman Bungalows. As you travel north, the District transitions into Craftsman style homes and various Revival style homes.

The Lincoln Park Historic District is generally located between Garey Avenue on the West, Towne Avenue on the East, Holt Avenue on the South, and McKinley Avenue on the North.
